Kevin Rhodes, President and Chief IP Counsel, 3M

Kevin Rhodes is the President and Chief Intellectual Property Counsel of 3M Innovative Properties Company in St. Paul, Minnesota, where he is responsible for managing the intellectual property assets of 3M Company and its worldwide affiliates. Mr. Rhodes is a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of the Intellectual Property Owner's Association, and serves as Chair of the Amicus Committee. He also serves as the Treasurer of the Board of Directors of the Intellectual Property Owner's Association Educational Foundation. Mr. Rhodes also is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Intellectual Property Law Association. and serves on the Executive

Committee of the Association of Corporate Patent Counsel. Mr. Rhodes chairs the Board of Advisors of the William Mitchell College of Law Intellectual Property Institute. He also serves on the Steering Committee of the PTO Pro Bono Inventor's Assistance Program. Mr. Rhodes has spoken widely on issues of intellectual property law and policy. Mr. Rhodes joined 3M in 2001. Prior to joining 3M, Mr. Rhodes was a partner at Kirkland & Ellis in Chicago, where he specialized in intellectual property litigation. Mr. Rhodes received his J.D., magna cum laude, from Northwestern University and his undergraduate degree from Grinnell College.



Dennis Skarvan, Deputy General Counsel, Caterpillar

Dennis manages Caterpillar's Intellectual Property practice group based in Peoria, IL with offices in the U.S., U.K., China, Japan and India. Dennis began his career as a design engineer with General Motors Corporation in 1984 before joining an IP law firm in Indianapolis, IN in 1990. He joined Caterpillar in 1993 as a patent attorney and has held various positions within Caterpillar's Legal Services Division. As an attorney at Caterpillar Financial Services Corporation from 1996-2001, he managed local and cross-border financing and supported regional office expansion in Asia. As general counsel for the Solar Turbines subsidiary of Caterpillar from 2008-2011, he managed the legal

offices of Solar Turbines in San Diego, CA and Europe. Dennis has been a speaker at IP meetings and is a member of the American Intellectual Property Law Association, Association of Corporate Patent Counsel, and on the Board of Directors for the Intellectual Property Owners Association. In 2012, Caterpillar received the International Law Office's Global Counsel Team Award for its Intellectual Property practice group. Dennis holds engineering degrees from General Motors Institute (now Kettering University) and Stanford University, and he received his JD degree from Indiana's School of Law in Indianapolis.

Hon. James Holderman, United States District Court, Northern District of Illinois

Judge James F. Holderman has served on the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois since 1985, and was Chief Judge of that court from July 1, 2006 to July 1, 2013. As Chief Judge, in addition to handling his assigned caseload, he over saw the court's \$27 million annual budget and 450 member staff. During his years on the court, Judge Holderman has presided in more than 10,000 cases in all areas of federal jurisdiction, and has served by designation on judicial panels of the United States Courts of Appeals for the Federal Circuit and Seventh Circuit. Before his appointment to the federal bench by President Ronald Reagan, Judge Holderman was a partner

in the international law firm now known as Dentons, where he specialized in federal court litigation. Before his years in private practice, he was an assistant United States attorney in Chicago and received several United States Department of Justice awards for distinguished service. Judge Holderman currently serves on the eight-member Board of the Federal Judicial Center, which is chaired by Chief Justice John G. Roberts, Jr. Judge Holderman is the founding chair of the ongoing Seventh Circuit Electronic Discovery Pilot Program, and a member of the Judicial Advisory Committee of the Sedona Conference. Additionally, he has co-chaired the ABA Litigation Section Trial Practice Committee and the ABA's Commission on the American Jury Project. He is also a past-president of the Richard Linn American Inn of Court. Judge Holderman is a recipient of "The Distinguished Intellectual Property Professional of the Year Award" from the Intellectual Property Owner's Association, the "Justice John Paul Stevens Award" from the Chicago Bar Association, and the "Mark T. Banner Award" from the ABA Section on Intellectual Property Law, as well as several other awards and honors from various other organizations, including the Chicago American Inn of Court, the Federal Bar Association, the Illinois Bar Foundation, the Intellectual Property Law Association of Chicago, Lawyers' Lend-A-Hand, and the Women's Bar Association of Illinois. Judge Holderman has been a speaker at numerous judicial and bar association seminars, both nationally and internationally. Over the past three decades, Judge Holderman has taught at several law schools, including the University of Chicago Law School, the Chicago-Kent College of Law, The John Marshall Law School, and the University of Illinois College of Law, where for more than twenty years he has taught an intensive course titled AIntellectual Property Trial Advocacy@ with his wife Paula Hudson Holderman, who is an attorney and currently the President of the Illinois State Bar Association. Judge Holderman has been a contributing author of several publications on various legal topics. He received both his undergraduate degree and his law degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where he served as the managing editor of the law review.



Robert Lindefjeld, General Counsel, Nantero, Inc.

Robert was previously a Partner at Jones Day, where he was in charge of the Pittsburgh office Intellectual Property Group. He has been lead counsel and second-chair in numerous IP infringement matters in state and federal district court, arbitration, and the International Trade Commission in a wide variety of technologies including computer chips. He has also been Senior Vice President and General Counsel, iVentureLab.com. Before that he was a Law Clerk to The Honorable Joseph F. Weis, Jr. of the US Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit. He holds a JD from Widener University School of Law, where he was Editor-in-Chief of the Law Review. He holds a BS in Biology from

Norwich University, Military College of Vermont, and thereafter served as a Lieutenant in the United States Army Infantry. He is a Registered Patent Attorney and has been listed in *The Best Lawyers in America* and *Chambers USA, America's Best Lawyers for Business, Pennsylvania Super Lawyers* and *Massachusetts Super Lawyers*. He currently serves as Chairman of the American Bar Association Section of Intellectual Property Law, the world's largest organization of IP professionals, with a wide range of responsibilities including helping formulate our country's national policy in the area of patents, trademarks, and copyrights before the U.S. Congress, the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, the U.S. Copyright Office, and our nation's courts. In 2005, the federal court in Pittsburgh appointed him to serve as Co-Chair of the Local Patent Rules Committee for the Western District of Pennsylvania, one of the "pilot patent courts" recently established by Congress and was recently selected to serve as a "Master" for the Q. Todd Dickinson American Inn of Court, where he serves as the Treasurer and focuses on training young lawyers in intellectual property litigation. Other professional activities include his service as Chairman of the Licensing and Management of IP Assets Committee of the American IP Law Association (AIPLA), where he also serves as a member of the AIPLA's Professional Programs Committee, and is a past member of the Amicus Committee.

Henry Hadad is Senior Vice President and Deputy General Counsel, at Bristol-Myers Squibb Company, where he is Chief Intellectual Property Counsel responsible for all aspects of patent and trademark procurement, counseling, litigation, and policy. His office is located in Princeton, NJ. Henry has practiced IP law for over twenty years, with a focus on the pharmaceutical, biotechnology and medical device industries. He previously held the position of Vice President and Associate General Counsel at Schering Plough Corporation, where he was the Chief IP Counsel until 2009. Immediately prior to joining BMS in 2011, he was Associate Patent Counsel at Johnson & Johnson, where he

led the comprehensive care medical device, vision and diagnostics patent group. Earlier in his career, Henry was an attorney at Kenyon & Kenyon in New York and Sughrue, Mion in Washington, D.C. Henry is a member of the Board of Directors of the Intellectual Property Owners Association, the American Intellectual Property Law Association Education Foundation, and the Gibbons Institute of Law, Science and Technology Advisory Board, at Seton Hall University School of Law. He is also a member of the steering committee for the Sedona Conference working group on patent litigation best practices. Henry was an adjunct Professor at Seton Hall Law School, and has frequently presented on intellectual property topics on behalf of academic institutions, law associations, and industry groups. Prior to joining ST in 1990, Ms. Jorgenson was in private practice in commercial litigation in Dallas at the firm of Bickel & Brewer. Ms. Jorgenson also has 10 years of experience in sales and marketing at Westinghouse Electric Corporation prior to practicing law. Ms. Jorgenson received her BS from Saint Mary's College in 1978, her MS

Before joining 3M in 1997, Hildy, one of the founding partners of Minneapolis-based law firm Bowman and Brooke, had a national trial and appellate practice in the defense of product liability cases. Hildy is a member of the American Law Institute and the Sedona Conference Working Groups on Electronic Discovery and Patent Litigation Best Practices, and has previously chaired several committees of the Intellectual Property Owners Association (IPO). In 2011 she was appointed to the Federal

Practice Committee for the U.S. District Court for the District of Minnesota, and chairs its Subcommittee on Electronic Discovery.
